

NEW CORNEAL STORAGE TECHNIQUE ELIMINATING WAITING LIST FOR CORNEAL TRANSPLANTATION

Sydney/Sydney Eye Hospital and the Lions NSW Eye Bank have introduced a corneal storage technique – Organ Culture Storage – which significantly increases the potential donor pool and the storage time for donated corneas to be used for transplantation for up to 28 days – compared to six days with traditional cold storage.

Stored in an incubator at 34 degrees Celsius, organ culture corneas can be stored at a temperature close to the physiological temperature of the human body, and have resulted in a 47% increase in corneal transplants – effectively eliminating the waiting list for corneal transplantation.

Professor Gerard Sutton, Corneal and Refractive Surgery Specialist, Sydney/Sydney Eye Hospital and Acting Medical Director of the Lions NSW Eye Bank, said the advantages of using organ culture are significant and manifold.

"In 2005, the waiting time for a corneal transplant in NSW was two years. With the introduction of this technology we can now schedule patients for corneal transplantation within three months," Professor Sutton said.

"Through the higher temperature used in organ culture, metabolism of the cells are maintained and provide the corneal tissue with a complex mixture of amino acids and growth factor which enables it to repair damaged cells and maintain its normal function.

"In cold storage, low temperatures and the presence of antibiotics can make it difficult to detect any bacteria that may be present in the tissue, as most bacteria will not grow under these conditions. However, the 34 degree Celsius storage and additional microbiological testing of the Organ Culture Storage increases the safety of the donated corneas through improved sensitivity to detect bacterial and fungal contaminants," he said.

Donated eyes are examined as soon as possible to determine suitability for transplantation. The density of the endothelium within the donated eye is an index of the quality of the cornea and is key to the decision of suitable recipient selection.

Professor Sutton said, in cold storage, endothelial density assessment is performed within 12 hours from death, as after this period the endothelium becomes excessively folded. In Organ Culture Storage, this can be extended to within 24 hours, as the endothelial assessment is done at a later stage.

"As a result of the increased ability to detect microbial contaminants and extending the time from death to storage, Organ Culture Storage offers a larger donor pool from which donated corneas can be used for transplantation," Professor Sutton said.

SARAH'S NEW FOUND MOBILITY

The Warners Bay Lions Club recently received a request for assistance on behalf of Sarah Morrison.

Sarah Morrison is a delightful 21 year old young lady with a diagnosis of Cerebral Palsy. Sarah is non Verbal and after a back operation in 1995 her primary form of mobility is a manual wheel chair. Sarah is therefore dependent on her wheel chair and hoist for all transfers. Following a bone density test she was diagnosed as suffering quite marked Osteoporosis in her back and knees.

The most appropriate ways to manage osteoporosis and limit its progression is to carry out daily weight bearing activities like standing and muscle stretching and strengthening and interaction with her friends at face level.

Sarah's Family and Physiotherapist, Amanda, sought the assistance of Warners Bay Lions Club to allow the purchase, for Sarah, of an Easystand Evolve Adult Standing Frame which would allow Sarah to achieve a better life.

NSW-ACT Public Heath Care Foundation for help and a Grant Application for the remaining funding requirements was approved.

With the funding in place an order was placed for the Easystand Evolve Adult Standing Frame at a cost of \$8,665.00

The Stuart Centre of Croudace Bay, a Branch Office of the Spastic Centre of New South Wales co-ordinated and Sarah was fitted with the Easystand Evolve.

Sarah's improved life style was only achieved with the support of Lions and Lioness Clubs and the Lions Clubs NSW-ACT Public Healthcare Foundation for which Sarah and her family are truly grateful.

MUCH NEEDED EQUIPMENT FOR NEWBORN BABIES

The Women and Children's Health Unit at the Blue Mountains ANZAC Memorial Hospital is now better equipped to care for newborn babies in the children's ward and avoid the need to transport them to Nepean hospital.

Newborn babies often have some degree of jaundice and most are managed without intervention. The new phototherapy equipment enables treatment of moderate to severe jaundice in neonates (newborn babies) using special lights.

Keeping babies warm whilst providing phototherapy is vital and the new 'billisoft' phototherapy blanket allows the baby to receive the required light therapy without being exposed to the elements. The blanket also allows minimal interruption to the treatment as the baby may be fed whilst still wrapped in the 'billisoft' blanket.

Complimenting the 'billisoft' blanket is a new 'cosytherm' warming pad that is placed in the standard cot, providing a level of temperature control for babies that have difficulty maintaining their own temperature. Active warming of babies with a low birth weight can help reduce complications and improve their outcome.

Up until now the paediatric ward has not had this type of equipment resulting in many new-born babies having to be transferred to Nepean hospital.

In addition, there are now new mobile stands for the two High Flow Oxygen giving systems which provide support for a child's airway by providing humidified oxygen at a higher flow than standard delivery systems. This type of system is used in acute situations to support children with respiratory conditions.

The hospital had just \$4,500 of the \$13,916 it needed to acquire the equipment.

During the 2012 Leura Gardens Festival, residents of the Leura Fairways retirement village held a coffee shop and barbecue to raise the initial funds necessary to purchase the equipment. The residents were then joined in their efforts by the Blue Mountains Lions Clubs and the Lions Clubs NSW-ACT Public Health Care Foundation resulting in a shortfall of \$9,416 being provided to the hospital for the purchase of these much needed items.

Launch of New Office and Laboratory

August 2013

The NSW Minister for Health and Medical Research, Jillian Skinner, joined staff and guests including transplant recipients Mrs Carol Ang, Mrs Lina Macri and Lions representatives, on the 27th June to open the new state-of-the-art facility for the Lions NSW Eye Bank and NSW Bone Bank.

The Minister announced improved donation levels for eye and bone tissue, supporting the aims of the *2012 NSW Government Plan* to increase organ and tissue donation rates.

The new facility located at Sydney Hospital, is a state-wide clinical service for the identification and coordination of eye and tissue donors, and the retrieval, storage, preparation and distribution of corneas in NSW and the ACT.

These corneas are transplanted to restore vision for people who have become blind because their cornea is cloudy or irregular in shape due to injury, disease or infection.

The service is also for the retrieval and storage of musculoskeletal tissue from living and deceased donors. Tissue is used for orthopaedic and neurosurgical procedures for conditions that include delayed fracture healing, re-do hip replacements, knee and joint reconstructions and spinal surgery for people of all ages. Spinal fusions are undertaken for children suffering severe scoliosis, to stabilise their spine improve their ability to breathe and improve quality of life.

"I'm delighted to see this facility up and running, bringing together the essential life-changing work of expert clinicians who will improve the lives of more than 1,000 people this year alone."

"The waiting list for those needing a corneal transplant has dropped by 43 per cent in 2012," Minister Skinner said.

"Those donating the femoral head of the hip socket has increased by 51 per cent, while cadaveric musculoskeletal donors are up 16 per cent, improving the lives of more than 450 recipients."

"This is evidence of the success of the Government's promotion of organ and tissue donation. While we still have some way to go, these new figures reveal a pleasing improvement in NSW donation rates."

Minister Skinner toured the new facility with Dr Robert Herkes, State Medical Director, NSW Organ and Tissue Donation Service; Ms Jane Treloggen, Manager of the Lions NSW Eye Bank and NSW Bone Bank, Mr Terry Clout, Chief Executive, Organ and Tissue Donation Service and South Eastern Sydney Local Health District and

Mrs Janet McDonald, Board Member, South Eastern Sydney Local Health District and Professor Frank Billson former Medical Director of the Lions NSW Eye Bank. Unfortunately the current Medical Director, Professor Gerard Sutton was not able to attend due to the change in date.

The State Medical Director of the NSW Organ and Tissue Donation Service, Dr Robert Herkes, said "2012 was an impressive year for the Lions NSW Eye Bank with 483 eye donors, an increase of more than 26% from 2011. The outcome of this was 740 corneal transplants were performed and the corneal transplant waitlist fell by 43% in 2012"

"I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank the generosity of all our donors and their families", Dr Herkes said.

Appointment of Medical Directors Confirmed

The Medical leadership of the eye bank has been confirmed with the appointment of Professor Gerard Sutton as Medical Director and Dr Con Petsoglou as Deputy Medical Director. We are fortunate to have such

distinguished clinical and strategic leadership to assist us to meet the needs of our end-users, now and into the future.

Activity : 6 Month Report

The first six months of 2013 have continued to be busy for the Lions NSW Eye bank. From a corneal transplant perspective there has been a 1% increase compared to the first 6 months of 2012, from 10% less donors.

It is similar at the National level, where there has been a very slight decrease in the number of eye donors but an increase in the number of transplants performed compared to this time last year. This is likely due to improved donor selection and tissue utilisation.
